Sonus has a passion for good music, great friends, and fulfilling experiences.

We are a diverse community of low-voice musicians, welcoming singers of any gender, orientation, identity, or profession.

As a new ensemble we're looking to make our mark in the area's vibrant choral scene with the presentation of inspiring choral music at a high level, while creating unique collaborative opportunities for our performers, audiences, and community.

Sonus is the newest chapter of the previously named Canadian Men's Chorus, based in Toronto. The CMC was founded in 2010 with a mission to redefine tenor-bass choral music and secure its place within Canada's choral landscape. An amazing 12-year run culminated in a final performance at the Podium Choral Conference national festival in May 2022, presenting an all-Canadian program to a global audience.

Sonus will continue to build upon this mission with a renewed focus of bringing life to the best low-voice repertoire available. Our mandate places additional priority on Canadian works, and as major supporters of emerging composers Sonus will regularly commission and premiere new works. We've commissioned and premiered over 50 new Canadian works to date!

Ultimately our goal is to create an environment which enables each person to learn, be challenged, and be fulfilled by meaningful musical memories surrounded by collaborative and supportive partners in song!

About Greg



As a major advocate of the creation of new Canadian music, Greg is a dynamic conductor, vocal coach and music educator with an extensive traditional and contemporary repertoire. He has worked with concert choirs, church choirs, live theatre, and

vocal students in Canada and beyond. Greg is a sought-after guest conductor and is often called upon to lead master classes and workshops.

As Artistic Director of Sonus Voices (previously the Canadian Men's Chorus), Greg champions the creation of new Canadian choral music. Founded in 2010, the CMC commissioned and premiered over 50 new Canadian choral works. They performed at the Podium National Choral Conference, Stratford Summer Music Festival, CentreSpace for the Arts in London, Ontario, and the Muskoka Concert Association, and premiered new works with the Stratford Symphony Orchestra. With the Canadian Men's Chorus, Greg has been recorded as part of Aaron Jensen's album titled From Sea to Sea.

Greg is a past Assistant Conductor of the Orpheus Choir of Toronto (Robert Cooper), during which he made his Roy Thomson Hall (Toronto) debut.

As guest conductor for the Area All-State NYSSMA Conference in 2015, he had the privilege of directing the top 100 high-school voices in Western New York. In the summer of 2016, Greg conducted the Canadian Ambassador Choir during their Australia tour as part of the United Nations Choral Festival "Rhythms of One World".

About Gary

Along with his duties as accompanist to Sonus, Gary Forbes is the Director of Music at St. Cuthbert's Anglican Church (Leaside), and serves as accompanist to the instrumental programs at Brock University (St. Catharines). Gary also runs a private piano studio based in Oakville, and is an active freelance collaborative




pianist throughout Southern Ontario and the GTA.

Previously engaged as Accompanist to the Mississauga Children's Choir, Director of Music at Grantham United Church, and Director of Music for a variety of independent theatre companies throughout the Niagara Region, Gary has also worked closely with various choirs including the Niagara Men's Chorus, Chorus Niagara (Adult & Children's Choruses), Brock University Choruses, and Camerata Chorialis.

The Gaelic words of this song were written in 1856 by Highlander John Cameron of Ballachulish, Scotland, set to an air adapted from the English tune "Johnny stays long at the Fair". The song was performed on the bagpipes during the funerals of King George VI in 1952, John F. Kennedy in 1963, Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother in 2002, Queen Elizabeth II in 2022, Former Ontario Lieutenant Governor David Onley in 2023 and Former Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney in 2024.

O, chì, chì mi na mòrbheanna;

And there's bills in my wallet that weren't there
before.

And put the big city right out of my mind.
I'd go where the bluebells still nod in the breeze,
Snack on bologna and Mrs. Lamb's cheese.


